Key Vocabulary

links	A code or instruction which connects one part of a program or an element in a list to another.
clickbait	Content, on the Internet, whose main purpose is to attract attention and encourage visitors to click on a link to a particular web page.
bias	Inclination or prejudice for or against one person or group, especially in a way considered to be unfair.
compare	Draw an analogy between one thing and (another) for the purposes of explanation or clarification.
viewpoints	A person's opinion or point of view.
propaganda	Information, especially of a biased or misleading nature, used to promote a political cause or point of view.
insecure	Not sufficiently protected; easily broken into.
jealous	Feeling or showing an envious resentment of someone or their achievements, possessions, or perceived advantages.
representation	How the media presents ideas about groups of people to an audience.
discrimination	When a person is treated differently (not in a good way) because of some aspect of their identity.
insecurities	Not sure of oneself; filled with doubt.
ethnicity	Belonging to a population group made up of people who share the same cultural background.
diverse	Showing a great deal of variety.

Concepts

Relationships – learning to recognise healthy relationships, both in person and online.

Safety – the condition of being safe; freedom from danger, risk, or injury. This includes physical and emotional safety, as well as online safety.

Diversity – the concept of diversity encompasses acceptance and respect. It means understanding that each individual is unique, and recognising our individual differences. These can be along the dimensions of race, ethnicity, gender or religious beliefs.
