feelings	An emotion. <i>Love, anger, joy, and fear are human feelings.</i>
responsibility	Something for which a person is responsible; duty. <i>Cleaning the bathroom is my responsibility.</i>
kindness	The quality of being kind.

Concepts

Respect – This is a concept that refers to the ability to value and honour another person, both his or her words and actions, even if we do not approve or share everything he or she does.

Diversity – The concept of diversity encompasses acceptance and respect. It means understanding that each individual is unique, and recognising our individual differences.

Relationships - This concept focuses on relationships between family and friends. Children learn an awareness of different types of families and how they are of equal importance, challenging stereotypes of a 'normal family'.

Community -This concept teaches what it means to belong to a community. This begins with the school community, progressing to the wider local area. The children are taught about the different roles and responsibilities within a community and how they follow rules to work alongside each other showing respect and understanding.
