grief	Intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death.
illness	A disease or period of sickness affecting the body or mind.
disability	A physical or mental condition that limits a person's movements, senses, or activities.
religion	The belief in and worship of a superhuman controlling power, especially a personal God or gods.
same sex	Relating to or involving people of the same sex/gender.

Concepts

Respect - This is a concept that refers to the ability to value and honour another person, both his or her words and actions, even if we do not approve or share everything he or she does. It is accepting the other person and not trying to change them. Respecting another person is not judging them by their attitudes, behaviors or thoughts. It is not expecting for someone to be otherwise.

Diversity - The concept of diversity encompasses acceptance and respect. It means understanding that each individual is unique, and recognizing our individual differences.

Community - This concept teaches what it means to belong to a community. This begins with the school community, progressing to the wider local area.

Relationships - This concept focuses on relationships between family and friends. Children learn an awareness of different types of families and how they are of equal importance, challenging stereotypes of a 'normal family'. Friendships are also unpicked, to understand what a good friendship looks like, understanding why people are unkind and accepting friends for who they are, even when going against social stereotypes.
