## Key Vocabulary

stranger	A person whom one does not know or with whom one is not familiar.
deception	The action of deceiving someone.
privacy	The state of being free from public attention.
trust	Firm belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone or something.
social media	Websites and applications that enable users to create/share content or participate in social networking.
behaviour	The way in which one acts or conducts oneself, especially towards others.
cyberbullying	The use of electronic communication to bully a person, typically by sending messages of an intimidating or threatening nature.
pressure	The use of persuasion or intimidation to make someone do something.
problems	A matter or situation regarded as unwelcome or harmful and needing to be dealt with/overcome.
discrimination	Unjust or prejudicial treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of race, age, sex or disability.
society	People living together in an ordered community.
categorise	Place something in a class or a group.

### Concepts

**Relationships** – learning to recognise healthy relationships, both in person and online.

**Safety** – the condition of being safe; freedom from danger, risk, or injury. This includes physical and emotional safety, as well as online safety.

**Diversity** – the concept of diversity encompasses acceptance and respect. It means understanding that each individual is unique, and recognising our individual differences. These can be along the dimensions of race, ethnicity, gender or religious beliefs.
